Description

The breeches buoy was invented to help save people from shipwrecks. It was used with Manby's mortar and other devices that fired ropes over to ships.

Once a line had been set up between the shipwreck and the rescuers, the crew had to slide down the rope. This was very dangerous: if they fell off the rope they would fall into the sea and drown. Also, if a sailor was injured or unconscious, they could not slide down the rope.

The breeches buoy solved this problem. It is a giant pair of canvas shorts, attached to a cork lifebuoy. This could be hooked onto the rope just like a zip line. Survivors could sit in the breeches and slide down the rope. If the rope snapped and they fell in, then the lifebuoy would stop them from sinking.

Questions

- 1. The lifebuoy is painted bright orange and white, why do you think this is?
- 2. Breeches buoys were carried on ships in case of emergency, but they were expensive and ships didn't have to carry them. Make a poster showing captains why the breeches buoy is a good idea.
