Travel by public transport is recommended. The Docklands Light Railway extension stops at Cutty Sark for Maritime Greenwich. It also connects with the London Underground system at Bank and Connex services at Lewisham.

Frequent Connex trains reach Greenwich in around 20 minutes from Charing Cross, Waterloo East or London Bridge stations.

There are also regular riverboat services from Westminster, Embankment, Tower and Dome Piers.

Road connections from the M25 are best via the A2 Junction or A13/A102 Blackwall Tunnel.
