Activity support notes

Objective

To understand the range of goods traded by the Vikings as imports and exports.

What you will need

You will need:

- Classroom activity sheet C.pdf (Trade goods pictures)
- Classroom activity sheet D.pdf (Vikings and trade)
- Viking map blank.pdf

Activity

This activity can be done individually or in pairs. Using Classroom activity sheet C pupils will cut out trade good images and sort them into imports and exports. Using Classroom activity sheet D pupils will 'load up' the import and export knarr ships by sticking the appropriate trade images to them

This activity can be undertaken if you have made a visit to the museum and had a Viking taught session or could be undertaken through research books.

Using the blank map of Europe stick the images of rade goods to where the items originated.

Please note The answers to this activity are on this page, on the right hand column.

Outcomes

Children will see that the Vikings were traders as well as raiders, and that trade brought them a range of goods that could not be found or made at home.

- Timber and tar
- Antler and (whale/walrus) ivory objects

Note that luxury objects, which tend to predominate in the archaeological record, were only a small proportion of the trade in bulkier goods like grain, which do not.
