Description

The 'Jolly Roger' flag was flown to show that a ship's crew were pirates and to frighten their victims into surrendering without a fight. Most 'Jolly Rogers' include a skull or skeleton, some flags also include an hourglass, another common symbol representing death in 17th- and 18th-century Europe. Pirates would also often simply fly plain black flags. The flag above, with the red heart, belonged to the famous pirate Blackbeard.
