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Introduction

The National Maritime Museum tells the history of Britain's relationship with the sea. Its fascinating objects tell many stories of **migration** (when people move the place they live) and how these **journeys** impact on our sense of **belonging**.

Through objects and artworks we can learn about ours and other people's journeys.





Sea Deity By Eve Shepperd

Eve Shepherd worked with Action for Refugees in Lewisham (AFRIL) community to create this bust. It depicts not just one person, but a portrayal of an entire community. Each feature and object included in the bust was chosen by AFRIL to represent an important part of their identity.

Try drawing your favorite object, without taking the pencil off the paper.






Now draw your favourite object again, but this time reduce it to a simple shape.








This will become the symbol for your flag.

The sails of the ship are made from Dutch wax fabric. Like the artist Yinka, this fabric has connections to many places in the world.

It was inspired by an Indonesian design and the Dutch learnt how to massproduce it, and sold it to parts of West Africa where it became very popular.

- Why is it important that you tell this story?




