Young Advisors Group (YAG) - Manifesto

Our Vision

We want to:

- Provide opportunities for young people to develop skills and engage with the museum in and out of formal education.
- Ensure our schools programme for secondary audiences is always pitched accurately and is relevant by getting feedback directly from this audience.

We believe that:

- Young people should have a voice in the museum this will enable us as a museum to better understand how we can improve offerings targeted at young people.
- Young people should be provided with the opportunity to make meaningful contributions to the work that the Royal Observatory does.
- Young people can gain useful skills and knowledge from their participation in our programmes and/or activities.

Why is the YAG needed at the ROG?

- It fits with our strategy and provides a way of delivering outcomes we could otherwise not deliver.
- We have a social responsibility to provide a way for this audience to be able to follow on from experiences they have had with us to continue their educational journey.
- To allow our programmes to be as open and accessible as possible.
- Family engagement ends at roughly age 14; the YAG is the next step for a young person to develop their lifelong relationship with us.

Benefits for students:

- A place where they can build skills outside of school.
- An opportunity to develop specialist skills that a school environment wouldn't be able to provide.
- A chance to see how astronomers work in the real world and allowing them to do a little of what we do.
- A chance to develop their science and astronomy knowledge.

What is the age range?

Students aged 14-18 and in full-time education can join the Young Advisors Group.

Keeping a small spread of ages within the group (between 14-18) means that there isn't too much disparity between the maturity and abilities of the students and the activities set will be suitable for all.

How will be allocate spaces in sessions?

Although there is no cap on the number of students that can join the group, at present, no more than eight students can attend a YAG session and spaces are allocated on a first come first served basis where students must respond to a session invitation that is sent out via email.

How often will we ask for parental permission?

At the start of each academic year (September) we will ask each member to provide a parental permission form so that we can ensure the students meet the criteria (14-18 and in full time education) for that upcoming year of sessions and for the purposes of safeguarding.

What is expected of YAG participants?

- To provide a signed consent form at their first session which would be valid for the rest of that academic year.
- Be committed and do their best to attend each session and to attempt any presession activities that are set.
- Treat each other, and all people they interact with, politely and with respect. Any unfair or inappropriate treatment of others would not be accepted.
- No swearing, act sensibly and no rough games.

What is the role of the YAG coordinator?

The YAG coordinator's role is to run the programme and facilitate all sessions. The coordinator will:

- Accompany participants at all times while they are onsite.
- Answer queries that participants may have about the programme.
- Encourage students to participate in as many activities as possible.
- Do their best to ensure that the planned activities take place. If, for reasons beyond their control, a planned activity is unable to take place, the coordinator will provide students with a backup activity.
- Guide students through the activities and help out where needed.
